They will forward their report to the Council for final approval. Thanks to the generous donation fo Mr. Archer and the County of Brant, sufficient funds are available for the roof of both the Homestead and the Pavilion. A Tourism Grant which has been applied for further upgrades to the Homestead and grounds is pending a decision.

Over that time, she has served in many roles including President of the Women's Institutes of Nova Scotia, President of the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada (FWIC) and President of the Associated Country Women of the World (ACWW). Testimony to her excellent leadership and service, Ellen has received a honorary doctorate degree from St. Francis Xavier University, been inducted to the Canadian Agricultural Hall of Fame, received the Order of Canada as well as being the first recipient of the Adelaide Hunter Hoodless Women of the Year.

I am not a writer, but I think that I am suffering from Writer's Block this month. Last month my "Corner" was all about the Associated Country Women of the World's "Pennies for Friendship". One week after having sent this off to Angela Scott I "attended" our virtual Spring District meeting. There I learned that there would be no more Pennies for Friendship after July 1st, 2022. That



was something of a shock. And, we were told that ACWW now has a new logo. I had never read or heard that these changes were being contemplated by the ACWW Board. We were told that details would appear in the next issue of "The Countrywoman". That arrived in my mailbox two days ago and I am still absorbing it. 




The queen is celebrating her Platinum Anniversary and many WI members in the UK are knitting commemorative items.

BC Women Walk the World, submitted by Ruth Davis, Secretary for Somenos WI, Duncan B.C.

In March of 2022, Somenos Women's Institute of Duncan, B.C. offered a challenge to the South Vancouver Island WI District women to walk 125 km in the month of April to celebrate the 125th anniversary of the FWIC. We also included the ACWW Women Walk the World on April 29 and asked members to consider making it a fundraising event for the institute of their choice. The results are as follows.

Donna Jack, president of the SVI WI and member of Royal Oak walked 350.15 km in the 30 days and raised \$610.00. Arbutus WI of Victoria, walked a combined total of 384.54 km with one member walking 142.88 km on her own. Somenos WI of Duncan walked and rode (bicycle) over 300 km. One member (aged 76) walked 127.7 km. Over \$500 was raised for a bursary for young women continuing their education.

It has proven to be a fun challenge with women out in their community, enjoying nature and the companionship of fellow WI members.

Friend of WI award goes to Barbara Jenkins. Her name was put forward by Brackley WI for her service of supporting the work of Women's Institute.










On May 28, after a few technical difficulties, members met and discussed Justice Beverley MacLaughlin's book, The Truth be Told.
